Views from the Pews - Fire

By the time you read this, hopefully Los Angeles is safe again, and that we at home are not troubled by fire either, given the season. Fire awakens primeval fear in humans, because it signifies destruction, loss of control, and unimaginable heat. So many of our towns rely on volunteer firefighters – where would we be without them?

So it is interesting to see just how many Biblical references there are to fire. And it is not just the stuff that keeps us warm at night, not just the stuff we boil camping meals over. Nor is it confined to the Old Testament. Most references can be found there, but make no bones about it; fire gets a mention in Luke Chapter 3, alongside its opposite; water. This is right at the beginning of the New Testament. The reference arrives through the mouth of John the Baptist no less; an actor we associate with water, particularly the River Jordan. John identifies two parts to the Messiah Baptism; the Holy Spirit (soon to appear as a dove) and secondly, fire.

John then speaks directly to his audience, who must have been country folk who had seen many harvests. The wheat and the chaff were to be separated, and the chaff was to meet with 'unquenchable fire' presumably the same fire Moses saw which inhabited a bush but did not consume it.

This makes for uncomfortable reading, because there are no grey areas here; no fudge. The Child in the Manger has within a few weeks of the Church Year become decidedly Old Testament. You are either for Him or against Him.

This passage is worthy of long and detailed study, given particularly the juxtaposition between fire and water – allegedly in short supply in Los Angeles – and because the Messiah introduced by John uses a winnowingfork. Then there is the juxtaposition between fire and Holy Spirit. Can a bird survive fire? Where is the line between concrete description, and metaphor? Any illusions about the New Testament being a softer, kinder message are swept away. John's true ministry is revealed; the expectant questioners needed to be convinced – quickly – that this was indeed Isaiah's Messiah, the Son of God, equipped if necessary with that elemental Old Testament force; fire.

A reading from book of the prophet Isaiah (6:1-13)

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.'

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!'

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: 'Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!' And he said, 'Go and say to this people:

"Keep listening, but do not comprehend; keep looking, but do not understand." The communicant may respond each time Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.
