Views from the Pews – What are Cathedrals for?

We are all familiar with Jesus' entry into the Temple – His fury at the money-changers and pigeon sellers are a rare example of an apparent loss of self-control as He overturns tables and chases people outside; 'You have made my house a den of robbers.'

Predictably this passage makes us very cautious about the permissible uses of consecrated space. No room for ringing tills or credit-card readers in Church thank you very much. Accordingly, we put on concerts of 'serious' music, and permit the occasional flower festival, but that is usually the limit.

So it may come as a surprise to hear what they are doing in Chester Cathedral this month. For some years now, they have allowed the nave to be taken over by a model railway show no less, which is now a fixture in the calendar. It has become a tradition almost instantly, which all sounds very counter-intuitive.

But should it actually surprise us? Firstly, North-west England needs a bit of cheering up at the moment. Secondly, it's a hobby which carries social benefits. (There's research which suggests it's an ideal pastime for at-risk neurodiverse teenagers). Thirdly, Cathedrals are notoriously expensive to run and to maintain, so folk are presumably happy to pay an entrance fee. Lastly, and most importantly, these buildings were designed to be public spaces, to be open to all. Even though there's a background hum of debitcard readers on this occasion. Chester would not be doing this if it did not bring joy to many people. And is that word 'joy' the yardstick?

Yes, Jesus clearly intended there to be limits. Enough of our daily lives are now commercialized. A Cathedral is not a shop – least of all for pigeons – and we should be very careful not to impose financial barriers to entry into what we proclaim to be God's house. So joy could indeed be the yardstick. Joy that is inclusive, joy that signifies welcome, joy that makes our sacred spaces open to all. Joy – as CS Lewis argued – is a source of surprise.

So as we prepare for our earthquake strengthening project, let us think about the uses to which a modernized Cathedral can be put in the 21st Century. We have been gifted an incredible site and a wonderful building. What joys await us inside?

The Gospel (we remain standing and turn to face the gospel | Ka tū tonu tātou ki te whakarongo ki te Rongopai)

The holy Gospel according to John (6: 56-69) Praise and glory to God.

Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.' He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

When many of his disciples heard it, they said, 'This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?' But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, 'Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, 'For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father.'

Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So Jesus asked the twelve, 'Do you also wish to go away?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.' [NRSVA]

This is the Gospel of Christ. Praise to Christ, the Word.

The Sermon

God's Call

The bishop or priest says

E te whānau a te Karaiti [Dear friends in Christ], God is love, God gives us life. We love because God first loves us. In baptism God declares that love; in Christ God calls us to respond.

The Presentation for the Laying on of Hands

The bishop stands before the congregation.

The baptised who come to profess their faith and receive the laying on of hands by the bishop are brought forward and presented to the bishop with these words

Bishop Philip, I present N to profess their faith. Bishop Philip, I present N to re-affirm their faith.

The bishop shall then say

N, we welcome you as you come to profess and reaffirm your faith. At your baptism you were made a disciple of Christ, and we signed you with the cross.

Come now to receive the laying on of hands with prayer, to strengthen you for the work of God's kingdom.

The Affirmation

The congregation and candidates for laying on of hands, stand to respond in these affirmations.

Praise to God who has given us life.

All Blessed be God for the gift of love.

Praise to God who forgives our sin.

All Blessed be God who sets us free.

Praise to God who kindles our faith.

All Blessed be God, our strength, our hope.

Let us, the baptised,

affirm that we renounce evil and commit our lives to Christ.

All Blessed be God, JESUS IS LORD!

The bishop then says to the candidates for laying on of hands

What is your faith?

They respond

I believe and trust in God the Father, maker and sustainer of all things; and in God the Son, my Saviour Jesus Christ; and in God the Holy Spirit, giver of life and truth. This is my faith.

Commitment to Christian Service

Those who are baptised are called to worship and serve God. From the beginning, believers have continued in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers.

Will you commit yourself to this life?

Candidates

I will, with God's help.

Through God's grace, I will forgive others as I am forgiven;

I will seek to love my neighbour as myself,

and strive for peace and justice;

I will accept the cost of following Jesus Christ

in my daily life and work;

with the whole Church I will proclaim by word and action the Good News of God in Christ.

The Laying on of Hands

The candidates being conveniently placed, the bishop continues

Let us pray for *these* who *have* declared their commitment to Christ's service.

Silence

The bishop and people say responsively

Our help is in the name of the eternal God,

All who is making the heavens and the earth.

Come Holy Spirit

All bearing your gifts of grace.

The bishop prays

God of mercy and love, new birth by water and the Spirit is your gift, a gift that none can take away; grant that your servants may grow into the fulness of the stature of Christ. Fill them with the joy of your presence. Increase in them the fruit of your Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of love, patience and gentleness, the spirit of wonder and true holiness.

The bishop lays hands on each candidate in silence and then prays.

For confirmation

Bishop Creator Spirit,

strengthen N with your gifts of grace, to love and serve as a disciple of Christ.

Guide, protect, uphold *her/him* that s/he may continue yours forever. Amen.

For renewal

Bishop Creator Spirit,

rekindle in N your gifts of grace, renew her/his life in Christ and bring to completion all that your calling has begun. Amen.

At the conclusion of the laying on of hands for all the candidates, the bishop prays

Bishop Living God, empower your disciples to bring life to the world.

The people respond

All Amen!

May we and they together be found in Christ and Christ in us.

The Celebration of Faith (please stand / e tū tatou)

Let us rejoice with those who have committed themselves to Christ, and celebrate the faith of our baptism.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Father?

All I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Bishop Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

All I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of the Father, and will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

All I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Let us pray for the whole world, which is being renewed by the Word made flesh, Christ Jesus our Lord, giving thanks for God's goodness.

The following response ends each prayer:

Source of all life,

All Make known your glory.

The Ministry of the Sacrament

The peace of Christ be always with you. **And also with you.**

The Lord is here. God's Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to offer thanks and praise.

It is right indeed, it is our joy and our salvation, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God, at all times and in all places to give you thanks and praise through Christ your only Son.

You are the source of all life and goodness;

through your eternal Word you have created all things from the beginning and formed us in your own image; in all our diversity, you created us.

When we sinned and turned away you called us back to yourself and gave your Son to share our human nature.

By his death on the cross, he made the one perfect sacrifice for the sin of the world and freed us from the bondage of sin.

You raised him to life triumphant over death; you exalted him in glory. In him you have made us a holy people

by sending upon us your holy and lifegiving Spirit.

Therefore with the faithful who rest in him, with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying/singing:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

All glory and thanksgiving to you, holy Father; on the night before he died your Son, Jesus Christ, took bread; when he had given you thanks, he broke it, gave it to his disciples, and said: Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you; do this to remember me.

After supper he took the cup; when he had given you thanks, he gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins; do this as often as you drink it, to remember me.

Glory to you, Lord Christ; your death we show forth; your resurrection we proclaim; your coming we await; Amen! Come Lord Jesus. Therefore loving God, recalling your great goodness to us in Christ, his suffering and death, his resurrection and ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate our redemption with this bread of life and this cup of salvation. Accept our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving which we offer through Christ our great high priest.

Send your Holy Spirit that these gifts of bread and wine which we receive may be to us the body and blood of Christ,

The Invitation

Draw near and receive the body and blood of our Saviour Jesus Christ in remembrance that he died for us.

Let us feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

The minister says the following to each person.

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ which was given for you. Ko te tinana o tō tātou Ariki, i tukua nei mōu.

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which was shed for you. Ko ngā toto o tō tātou Ariki, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.
