

Views from the Pews - Work and Worship

Prior to Christmas, when visiting the Cathedral, I found myself with half an hour to spare. Not being in the habit of frittering time, I pondered what to do!

Soon this question was interrupted by the sound of one of the Cathedral organists having a practice session. I felt moved to discreetly enter, find a pew behind a pillar and take the opportunity for quiet reflection ahead of the Christmas frenzy. The organist alternated between the familiar and a piece unknown to me that made me think earthquake proofing was probably a good idea for the now aged edifice.

This frivolous thought was interrupted by the quiet entry of someone with a mop and bucket who proceeded to clean between the pews. The simple, steady, yet rhythmic movement seemed a contradiction to the skill required for the strident music coming from the organ pipes.

Both activities were "work", willingly and diligently performed while presenting a stark contrast in their complexity. To me, the silent observer, both seemed to be an act of worship, in what is a sacred place.

So often human frailty can lead to our passing judgement as to which of these two activities might be considered the "greater work" or gift. We all have our own understanding of the value given to paid versus unpaid work.

We perhaps may even ponder which might be the greater act of worship, and lastly are these components necessary for a place to be deemed sacred? Our answers may surprise us, and not necessarily be congruent with those of our maker, the giver of all gifts and to whom all glory is due. Paul, in many of his letters to the early church, referred to such matters and warned the believers of his day against the folly of placing human values on them. In his second letter to the Corinthians chapter eight, verse twelve, he says, 'For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to what a man has, not according to what he hath not.'

As we reflect on these questions we could then ask, 'How well do I use my gifts within the sacred place of the Cathedral?' and 'Do I see these as acts of worship to God?' But perhaps the greater question is, 'Do I earnestly seek his presence in the quiet, sacred place of being alone with him?'

We bless you for your new creation, brought to birth by water and the Spirit, and for your grace bestowed upon us your children, washing away our sins.

May your holy and life-giving Spirit move upon these waters. Restore through them the beauty of your creation, and bring those who are baptized to new birth in the family of your Church.

Anoint your children with power from on high, and make them one with Christ in the freedom of your kingdom. For all might, majesty, dominion and power are yours, now and for ever. **Alleluia. Amen.**

Almighty God, in our baptism you have consecrated us to be temples of your Holy Spirit. May we nurture your indwelling Spirit with a lively faith, and worship you with upright lives; through Jesus Christ.

Preparation of the Gifts

The Great Thanksgiving (please stand, sit or kneel as you are most comfortable throughout the following prayer / mō tēnei inoi katoa, e noho, e tū, tūturi rānei i runga anō i tāu e pai nei)

The Lord is here.

God's Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to offer thanks and praise.

It is the joy of our salvation, God of the universe, ANZPB/HKMoA p. 485 to give you thanks through Jesus Christ.

You said, 'Let there be light'; there was light.

Your light shines on in our darkness.

For you the earth has brought forth life in all its forms.

You have created us to hear your Word, to do your will and to be fulfilled in your love. It is right to thank you.

You sent your Son to be for us the way we need to follow and the truth we need to know.

His star, mysterious and inviting, calls us to worship the Christ who is born.

For he is Emmanuel, God revealed in human form for all the human race; to him we offer our homage and our gifts.

You sent your Son to give his life to release us from our sin. His cross has taken our guilt away.

You send your Holy Spirit to strengthen and to guide, to warn and to revive your Church. Therefore, with all your witnesses who surround us on every side,

countless as heaven's stars, we praise you for our creation and our calling, with loving and with joyful hearts we say/sing:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed are you, most holy, in your Son, who washed his disciples' feet. 'I am among you,' he said, 'as one who serves.'

On that night before he died he took bread and gave you thanks.

He broke it, gave it to his disciples, and said:

Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you; do this to remember me.

After supper, he took the cup, and gave you thanks.

He gave it to them and said:

Drink this. It is my blood of the new covenant, shed for you, shed for all, to forgive sin; do this to remember me.

Therefore with this bread and wine we recall your goodness to us.

God of the past and present, we your people remember your Son. We thank you for his cross and rising again, we take courage from his ascension; we look for his coming in glory and in him we give ourselves to you.

Send your Holy Spirit,

that we who receive Christ's body may indeed be the body of Christ, and we who share his cup draw strength from the one true vine.

Called to follow Christ, help us to reconcile and unite. Called to suffer, give us hope in our calling.

For you, the heavenly one, make all things new; you are the beginning and the end, the last and the first.

Praise, glory and love be yours, this and every day, from us and all people, here and everywhere. Amen.

The Communion

The Lord's Prayer (You may wish to pray the Lord's Prayer in your own language. The choir will sing.)

As Christ teaches us we pray

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.

The Invitation

Come God's people, come to receive Christ's heavenly food.

The minister says the following to each person.

The bread of life, broken for you. Te taro o te ora, i whatīa nei mōu.

The cup of blessing, poured out for you. Te kapu o te ora, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time: Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.

Prayer After Communion

Blessed be God who calls us together.

Praise to God who makes us one people.

Blessed be God who has forgiven our sin.

Praise to God who gives hope and freedom.

Blessed be God whose Word is proclaimed.

Praise to God who is revealed as love.

Blessed be God who alone has called us.

Therefore we offer all that we are and all that we shall become.

Accept, O God, our sacrifice of praise.

Amen. Accept our thanks for all you have done.

Our hands were empty, and you filled them.

Blessing (please stand / e tū tātou)

May the Creator lead you in your pilgrimage to find the Lord. May the Redeemer transform your lives and make glad your hearts. May the Giver of Life pour out gifts for service on you who have come to the waters of new birth.

And the blessing of God Almighty, Creator, Redeemer, and Giver of Life, be upon you and remain with you, with those whom you love, and with those whom you struggle to love, this day and always. **Amen.**
