

Views from the Pews - Colour

Our pew sheet for 12 January may have shocked some, as David Zelenka's portrayal of Christ and John the Baptist departs from habitual tradition and makes both men most definitely not European. Our Western tradition is 'habitual' in that we tend to think of Christ as 'white'. This habit has deep roots, harking back to Orthodox and Renaissance art, where Christ is usually portrayed as probably European, albeit with a beard.

Does this actually matter? Does it matter what Christ actually looked like?

Yes it does, particularly if you are a non-European Christian of colour. One of our biggest challenges today is to remind ourselves that we are a truly global movement, and that European Christians are probably in a minority. So we need to be aware of old habits. Christianity does not 'belong' to Europe, or to Russia, or to anywhere else for that matter. Zelenka set out to confront. He presumably knew our habits and asks us to re-examine them.

Tissot (26 January) also requires our attention albeit for slightly different reasons. His Jesus is not particularly western in appearance, and Tissot's other faces seem to blend well with his obvious care to place Luke's account where it really belongs: in a Synagogue. We are reminded again of the place and time of the Gospel stories. Tissot too seems to be saying "this is not Europe".

But neither artist seems to be requiring an apology: we are all creatures of inherited culture. But we need to be aware; if our mission is to spread the Gospel, we need to be mindful of how others might see us. It would for instance be useful to explore Islam; could it possibly be a reaction to a Judeo-Christian narrative that claims priority to the eastern shore of the Mediterranean? No evidence is offered here – just an invitation to be mindful, especially at a time when ancient memories are stoking the fires of conflict again.

And in any debate about the Treaty of Waitangi, the subconscious assumptions of its parties and its enablers are crucial. What assumptions did the missionaries bring? Was their Jesus as portrayed by Zelenka, or was He something different?

The visual arts have played an influential role in Christianity; long may they continue to challenge our thoughts.

But someone will ask, 'How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?' Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies.

And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, 'The first man, Adam, became a living being'; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

The holy Gospel according to Luke (6:27-38) **Praise and glory to God.**

The Sermon

The Affirmation of Faith (please stand / e tū tatou) Liturgist: Let us stand and together affirm our faith.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became fully human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who in unity with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, and has spoken through the prophets.

Preparation of the Gifts

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to offer thanks and praise.

It is right indeed, it is our joy and our salvation, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God, at all times and in all places to give you thanks and praise through Christ your only Son.

You are the source of all life and goodness;

through your eternal Word you have created all things from the beginning and formed us in your own image; in all our diversity, you created us.

When we sinned and turned away you called us back to yourself and gave your Son to share our human nature.

By his death on the cross, he made the one perfect sacrifice for the sin of the world and freed us from the bondage of sin.

You raised him to life triumphant over death; you exalted him in glory. In him you have made us a holy people by sending upon us your holy and lifegiving Spirit.

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which was shed for you. Ko ngā toto o tō tātou Ariki, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.
