Views from the Pews – Islam and Us – 2024

Diane and I recently flew Emirates Airlines to the UK via Dubai airport. By some measurements, they are respectively the largest airline, and the largest airport, in the world, and you do not have to look far to see evidence of a socio-economic shift in world affairs, a change that may yet be accelerated by the Gaza situation. This will come as a shock to many, brought up with the idea that the Judeo-Christian world was inherently superior, and/or that the Islamic world was a metaphor for disorder, disruption and for what we now call terrorism.

But the Muslim world is clearly here to stay.

Is there an opportunity here, particularly for nations or churches who see that world not as a threat, but as a basis for co-operation?

Two examples spring to mind. Firstly, 99% of Turkish people identify as Muslim, yet, every 25th April, they welcome us at Gallipoli. That gathering has rebounded since COVID19, which suggests a degree of resilience, a wish to build a current and future narrative, and a rejection of past dogma.

Secondly, after the Christchurch Massacre, our then Government led a pastoral initiative towards Muslim groups both in the city and beyond; again, an opportunity was seized to create healing out of pain. Is this initiative still on foot? If not, it represents an opportunity for outreach to a minority community who may still be feeling threatened by world events way beyond their control.

It is an opportunity presented to those churches who do not align with extremist Zionism (or for that matter extremist Islam), to seek out partnerships - we have a great deal in common. In particular, we have a common interest in avoiding the misinterpretation of Scripture. The Koran, like parts of the Bible, can be hijacked by the forces of violence and fear. A dialogue is well overdue, and there is a middle ground in which we can all be made to feel safe.

After all, you could get alcohol on all our flights, the female cabin crew never complied with the usual stereotypes, and the only sign of Islam was a compass as part of your flight data – pointing towards Mecca and advising when the next round of prayer was due.

There's a Mosque in Hamilton – how many of us even know it is there?

A reading from the first book of the prophet Samuel (15:34-16:13)

Then Samuel went to Ramah; and Saul went up to his house in Gibeah of Saul. Samuel did not see Saul again until the day of his death, but Samuel grieved over Saul. And the Lord was sorry that he had made Saul king over Israel.

The Lord said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.' Samuel said, 'How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.' And the Lord said, 'Take a heifer with you, and say, "I have come to sacrifice to the Lord." Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you.' Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, 'Do you come peaceably?' He said, 'Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice.' And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord.' But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.' Then lesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel. He said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Then Jesse made Shammah pass by. And he said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen any of these.' Samuel said to Jesse, 'Are all your sons here?' And he said, 'There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep.' And Samuel said to lesse, 'Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here.' He sent and brought him in. The Gospel (we remain standing and turn to face the gospel | Ka tū tonu tātou ki te whakarongo ki te Rongopai)

The holy Gospel according to Mark (4:26-34) **Praise and glory to God.**

He also said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. All who are baptised are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.
